





Reasons We Need Police-Free Schools

Police presence in Black schools started in the 1930s and increased after the civil rights movement. Black youth protested for more resources, but instead were met with police in militarized gear.

"Police in schools create the bridge from the school to the prison pipeline. That's an experience that no child should have."
- Raven, 18 years old. When police are in our schools, students of color are more likely to be arrested and experience violence.

Black youth are not criminals. The actions of Black youth that police respond to are acts of survival, expressions of adolescent behavior or responses to trauma.

Policing our youth is ineffective, expensive and takes away from essential resources our youth need to live and thrive. The dollars city leaders direct to more policing could be used instead to invest in our communities.

100% of arrests made in DC schools are of students of color!
